## EUROPEAN SUCCESS



**Jersey came 3<sup>rd</sup> on Net Run Rate in the recent ICC European Division 1 U17 Championships held in Belfast** managing to beat eventual runners-up Scotland in a thrilling match at Stormont. Ireland were crowned U17 Champions but Jersey racked up what must be a tournament record against Denmark, scoring 391-4 and winning by 156 runs. Jersey won the Spirit of Cricket Award which was picked up by Captain Ben Stephens whilst Jersey's Tim de la Haye won the Player of the Tournament Award.

**Jersey were Runners-Up in the ICC European Division 1 U15 Championships in Dundee.** Jersey led the tournament from day one, beating Ireland by 68 runs, Scotland by 14 runs and The Netherlands by 85 runs. However Jersey saw the title snatched from their grasp when they were beaten by Denmark and hosts Scotland overcame Ireland in a rain affected match to snatch victory, again on Net Run Rate. Jersey player Ryan Evans won the Player of the Tournament Award.

## ICC EUROPE U19 DIVISION 1 WCQ CHAMPIONSHIPS

Jersey hosted the ICC European U19 Division 1 World Cup Qualifiers recently and welcomed Ireland, Scotland, The Netherlands, Guernsey and Denmark to the Island. Jersey beat Denmark by 59 runs and Guernsey by 5 wickets, earning 4<sup>th</sup> place in the tournament. Ireland took the top honours with the Netherlands the runners-up and Scotland in 3<sup>rd</sup> place.

## U11 GUERNSEY FESTIVAL

Jersey's U11 side had a successful festival in Guernsey recently. The youngsters, ably coached by Peter Gough, won 2 out of their 3 games against Guernsey and County opposition. At KGV on a hot day playing against Guernsey, Will Giles got the team off to a great start with a quick-fire 35 and featured in a useful partnership of 70 with Jonty Jenner. Then strong-hitting Solomon Warner came in ending on 33 as he and Jenner put on a superb stand of 85, Jenner ending up with 67 as the JCB closed on a creditable 185. But Guernsey batted very well, a useful partnership between Nightingale and Fazackerly realizing 95 runs and good bowling at the death from Luke Hinton (4 overs for 2 runs) was required to eke out a narrow victory by 8 runs.

At 2 for 2 against Dorset after only 4 balls, JCB needed another good partnership, and this time it was Josh Le Cornu who dug in for a highly effective 13 runs in another 50+ partnership again with Jenner. Warner then repeated his previous days heroics with 39 runs in a magnificent partnership of 113 with Jenner who started the final over on 89. He managed a boundary off the first ball, then 2 more, then lost the strike and was able to scramble 2 more off the last ball of the innings to finish undefeated on 98 – a remarkable effort. The total of 200 was always likely to be too many and Dorset ended on 114-3. Will Kaye, Harry Jenkins and Warner being the successful bowlers.

The final game against East Devon saw some changes to the batting line up which didn't exactly work as planned – Giles and Charlie Ellam took the score to 27-3 but a collapse saw a slump to 33-7. Jenner, batting this time at number 9 was ably assisted by Massimo Furness in a 44 run partnership, of which Furness made a high-quality 29. Ollie King at number 11 may only have scored 3 runs but his partnership with Jenner for the last wicket was 42 and JCB recorded 137 all out – Jenner 56 not out. Good bowling from Kaye who took an early wicket, backed up by strong fielding (a good run out from Warner) kept the pressure on the Devonshire side, but in the heat further wickets were not forthcoming and East Devon eventually crawled over the line in the 35th over to win by 8 wickets.

The festival was overall a fantastic intensive learning experience for some highly promising young cricketers.

## BRYANSTON FESTIVAL by Ward Jenner

The JCB U12 side recently returned from a successful, if rain-affected, festival at the magnificent Bryanston College in Dorset. Our first game against Dorset was a low-scoring affair on a rain-affected wicket but the Jersey bowlers performed creditably to dismiss the powerful county side for 128 – leading contributors being Jonty Jenner with 2-7 and Will Harris with 2 wickets from the final two balls of the innings. David Martin conceded just 2 runs from his 3 overs. However it was always going to be a tricky run chase, with textbook shots from James Duckett, Solly Warner and Jonty Jenner failing to penetrate a well-set field.

At 63-9 all seemed lost when with 17 overs remaining last man Phil Maguire joined Elliot Miles at the crease. Incredibly they were able to keep out the Dorset attack for over after over and the unlikely prospect of batting out for a draw became more and more of a possibility. Dorset threw everything at the two plucky batsman who remained defiant before unluckily, with just 2 balls remaining, Miles was out caught behind after top-scoring with 22 and surviving for over an hour with sterling support from Maguire.

The rain lashed down for the next 36 hours but thanks to the incredible facilities, an 8-a-side indoor tournament was hastily arranged and the Jersey team played magnificently, everyone contributing in 3 excellent wins against Dorset, Wiltshire and old friends and rivals Guernsey. Highlights included Will Harris completing his “hat-trick” by taking a wicket with his first ball of the day and best team score of the tournament – 118 in 12 overs, 50 from Sol Warner and some brilliant fast, full bowling by Dan Santos Costa. Jonty Jenner hit 3 straight sixes and the opposition had no answer to our powerful batting.

When the rain finally cleared we were able to take our new-found confidence into the game against Wiltshire. Asked to bat first in very tricky conditions, sensible batting led us to 59-2 with 20 overs remaining - Elliot Miles and Jenner contributing 22 runs each in a 3rd wicket stand of 40 runs. However the tail fell away and we were forced to defend a score of 97. Off-spinner Warner opened the bowling and took 4-22 off 13 overs and with great support from James Duckett (11 overs 1-11) and some quick full bowling from Dan Santos-Costa (1-10), Wiltshire were bowled out for just 74.

So a fantastic learning experience for this highly promising unit and when bonus points were calculated the JCB under 12's were able to be pronounced Festival Champions. Huge thanks to Lee Meloy for his enthusiastic support.

### Ashes Portfolio

**Profit of 5 points**

**Void bet – only played two tests.**

**Morrison total profit 87 points**
